If your child's meal option does change from the term before, please ensure that you inform the main school office.


Wellness Tip

How we manage lateness

The school day starts at 9:00am and we expect your child to be in school ready for assembly at that time. They should be in the playground by 8:55am. Registers are marked by **9:00am** and your child will receive a 'late' mark if they are not in by that time.

If your child arrives after that time, they will receive an unauthorised absence mark that shows them to be on site but **not** counted as a present for statistical / legal purposes. Black History Month

The Black History Month celebrations at St John St James have well and truly begun. We use the month of October to celebrate the history, heritage and culture of black people in Britain and overseas.

Year 1 begun by looking at what Black History is and why it is important to study black, British history.

Year 2 have learnt about The Caribbean and who The Windrush generation were, including the profound impact they still have on Hackney and our city today.

Year 3 have learnt about Africa and the fascinating kingdoms that were discovered when Europeans explored the continent.

Year 4,5 and 6 have started learning about The British Empire and its role in The Transatlantic Slave Trade. Through analysing sources of evidence, they have built hypotheses about whether The British Empire was a positive or negative period of history and examined how Britain benefitted from The Transatlantic Slave Trade.

The classes have then used their learning in humanities to inspire and produce a non-fiction piece of writing in their English lessons. In art, the children have each studied a Black artist, who they have carried out research about. The children really enjoyed analysing the art work produced by these artists, before creating their own designs! Year 1 and 2 worked on weaving, whilst Key Stage 2 carried out printing artwork, using polystyrene and lino.


Amazing Work...

Britain's Colonies




In **Year 5**, the class learnt about miracles vs magic in a science lesson, which had an oracy focus! They had a debate about the differences between miracles and magic.


