Why is learning to read so important?

• Reading is essential for your child's future academic achievement, well-being and success in life.

• Good reading, writing and language development is essential for success as an adult.

• Children who struggle to read struggle in all subjects.

• Enjoying reading and choosing to read have social and emotional benefits for children.



Components of Reading

Comprehension =

 Learning new vocabulary
 Carefully chosen Key texts
 Whole school Oracy focus
 Talk Partners, Book talk (discussions and questions),
 Reflective Writing, & Guided Reading

 Reading for Pleasure = Daily Storytime, Golden Books, Reading Den, Author of the Half Term, Golden Reading Tea Parties, Class books

 Word Reading = Phonics Daily home reading Irregular words



Early Learning Goals

Literacy

Comprehension

- Demonstrate understanding of what has been read to them by retelling stories and narratives using their own words and recently introduced vocabulary.
- Anticipate (where appropriate) key events in stories.
- Use and understand recently introduced vocabulary during discussions about stories, nonfiction, rhymes and poems and during role play.

Word Reading

- Say a sound for each letter in the alphabet and at least 10 digraphs.
- Read words consistent with their phonic knowledge by sound-blending.
- Read aloud simple sentences and books that are consistent with their phonic knowledge, including some common exception words.

Writing

- Write recognisable letters, most of which are correctly formed.
- Spell words by identifying sounds in them and representing the sounds with a letter or letters.
- Write simple phrases and sentences that can be read by others.

What is Phonics?

 The way to teach children how to read and spell words.
 Phonics helps children hear, identify and use different sounds that distinguish one word from another in the English language.

 Written language can be compared to a code. Knowing the sounds of individual letters and how those letters sound when they're combined will help children decode words as they read and know which letters to use when they are writing words.

 Phonics involves matching the sounds with individual letters or groups of letters.

For example, the sound k can be spelled as c (cat), k, or ck (kick).

How to say the phonic sounds



 Reading a text aloud accurately with expression and pace that shows your child understands what they are reading.



• each letter has a formation rhyme


a - around the apple, down the leaf





Phonics at SJSJ Success For All - SFA

- 2 new sounds a week
 1 irregular word a week
- Daily practice 'Say It Fast' and 'Break It Down'
 Sample lesson example
- Daily writing / early mark making



 Children reading fully decodable book at school four times a week from January (Reading Roots)

 - Returning books and reading records T & F
 - Communicating through reading records
